## ELIZABETH MINISTRY SUPPORTS, AFFIRMS, ENCOURAGES WOMEN

There are many wonderful examples of outreach ministries here at St. John the Baptist, and perhaps none has touched more women than the Elizabeth Ministry. This ministry, established almost 20 years ago, follows the scripture story of the Visitation by bringing together women who share a similar story. The purpose is to affirm, encourage and assist women in response to their needs during the childbearing years.

In the past, the presence, intimacy and support needed during childbearing years were found in the structure of family, neighborhood and church. Today these structures are undergoing rapid change:

- Neighborhoods are fragmented, leaving many families isolated.
- Churches have increased in size, making it sometimes difficult to create a warm, hospitable, personal and loving environment.
- Mobility has caused many extended families to be separated by miles, making frequent visits improbable and presence impossible.

The wisdom, reassurance and advice, usually given by extended family, often now need to come from another source. That's where the Elizabeth Ministry comes into play! By sharing their stories and experiences, women serve one another in an atmosphere of faith, love and hope.

The Elizabeth Ministry assists women in a number of ways, including:

#### **Prayer Partner Program**

The Elizabeth Ministry assigns "prayer partners" to pray for women who are pregnant, waiting to adopt or experiencing infertility. If you know of someone who is expecting or who needs prayers, please fill out a rose, located by the guardian angel statue in the Narthex (white ribbon = pregnancy, yellow = adoption and violet = infertility.) This person will be given a prayer partner who will journey with them in prayer. Once the prayer partner is assigned, the rose is placed in the vase in front of the Blessed Mother statue in church. Prayer Partner Coordinator Fran Dickinson explains, "As Mary and Elizabeth, together in prayer, you can share this special time in your life, asking God's blessing on you and your child."

#### Meals/Assistance

"There are times in our lives where we all need extra help," says Meal Delivery Coordinator Lisa McFadden. "The Elizabeth Ministry is in place to lend a sympathetic ear, a partner in prayer and to support families with the delivery of meals during difficult times."

Lisa said she joined the ministry when "a wonderful woman named Linda Pass told me about the ministry when our now 16-year-old was in kindergarten." Lisa enjoyed giving to others, but it was several years later that she learned how it felt to be on the receiving end.

"Four years ago, after a sudden health crisis, I became the recipient of meals instead of the deliverer. So I can tell you as someone on both ends of the Elizabeth Ministry meal train, it is good to give and to receive! When it's an uphill battle to recovery, knowing that someone cares enough to feed your family can give you the strength it takes to put one foot in front of the other."

#### **Parent Letters**

After the first Baptism in a family, the Elizabeth Ministry sends parents letters of encouragement, focusing on helping their child get to know God and the church. These are sent every six months for 3 years and include letters from the pastor and age-related encouragement and prayer materials for the parents. Parishioner Mary Joyce Heathcott coordinates the Parent Letters.

#### Feast of the Holy Innocents Mass

The Elizabeth Ministry organizes the annual Feast of Holy Innocents Mass in commemoration of the children who were ordered killed by King Herod in his quest to find baby Jesus.

The mass celebrated at St. John the Baptist in December, is also in remembrance of all children lost through accident or illness, childbirth, miscarriage and abortion. The Ministry is responsible for organizing this service, including providing the program, liturgical ministers, music and all other related services.

Currently, the St. John the Baptist Elizabeth Ministry is about 80 women strong, but continues to search for and encourage new volunteers. The ministry could use people in all areas – especially to prepare/deliver meals and serve as prayer partners. ## PRAYER GARDEN AT MAUSOLEUM FEATURES SAINT PEREGRINE STATUE

A place of prayer has been added to the St. John the Baptist Mausoleum property with the addition of a statue of Saint Peregrine Laziosi, the patron saint of people suffering from cancer. Parishioner Pat Krack and family provided the funding for the statue of St. Peregrine following husband Jerry's death from cancer. (Jerry was a longtime member of the StJB Cemetery and Mausoleum Board.) The placing of the statue in front of the Mausoleum provides a serene prayer



setting for those with cancer - or for friends and family to pray for loved ones with cancer. Saint Peregrine Laziose was born in the 1260s in Forli, Italy. As a young man, he was somewhat of a rebel against the church in Rome, but after a confrontation with a Church official, he channeled his energy into good works.

This statue of Saint Peregrine Laziosi, located in front of the St. John the Baptist Mausoleum, provides a serene prayer setting for those who have been affected by cancer. Eventually, he joined the Friar Servants of Mary in Siena, Italy, and then returned to Forli, where he spent the remainder of his life dedicating himself to the care of the sick, poor, and those on the fringes of society. Peregrine imposed on himself the penance of standing whenever not necessary to sit. This led to leg problems which deteriorated into open sores and eventually cancer. His leg was to be amputated, but the night before surgery Peregrine prayed before the image of the crucified Christ. When he awoke, the wound was healed, and the leg was saved. He lived another twenty years and died May 1, 1345.

St. Peregrine was canonized on December 27, 1726 as the patron saint of those suffering from cancer. His body rests in the Servite Church in Forli. The Cemetery and Mausoleum Board, on behalf of the St. John the Baptist Church Community, would like to thank Patricia Krack and family for providing the statue of St. Peregrine in memory of Jerry. All are welcome to use this prayer garden! It is located outside the Mausoleum off Bell Road (use the Bell Road entrance).

# RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)

**E** aster is upon us and our "Elect" will become our "Neophytes" on April 19, 2014, as we celebrate their reception into the Catholic Church and the parish of St. John the Baptist at the Easter Vigil. We will continue to celebrate and walk with them through a period of "mystagogia" continuing through the years ahead.

"Neophyte" simply means "recent convert; a beginner, a novice." It is from the Greek word "neophutos" meaning "newly planted." Our neophytes continue to grow as they become part of this community and the life of the parish in various ways. "Mystagogia" is that period of time of reflecting on the gospel, sharing in the Eucharist and doing works of charity that leads them (and all of us) into a deepening grasp of the paschal mystery and making it a living part of community.

Mystagogy is that final period of the RCIA process, and the beginning of a life of discipleship with Jesus Christ. The journey of faith now focuses upon the greatest of all mysteries: Christ's life, death and resurrection as they continued to seek these answers: What happened? What happens now? How has my life been changed? The neophytes are now celebrating with the entire community at the Sunday Eucharist. They are beginning to realize that the RCIA is not a program "to make Catholics", but a process of

focusing on the response to a call to a particular "gospel way of life." Just as each one of us answers the call of conversion to the gospel message on a daily basis in our own lives, so too, they become a messenger of the gospel of Christ to others.
