ENHANCEMENTS MADE TO CHURCH ENVIRONMENT

Many parishioners began noticing some subtle and not-so-subtle changes to the church environment beginning this past Fall. It started with a statue of St. Francis of Assisi placed outside the church entrance and surrounded by flowers and bird seed (signifying his connection to animals) near his October Feast Day. Then a statue of Mary draped with cloth and flowers appeared for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception (December 8). Advent ushered in a number of changes including different banners, cloths and candles and - at Christmastime – our church decorations were enhanced even more with new touches such as the baptismal font "Advent wreath."

These changes are the mastermind of St. John the Baptist Environmental Committee members Karla Dehner and Karen Hanley. Karen said she and Karla are able to enhance the church environment by planning for upcoming Feast Days and

liturgical celebrations. They work ahead to plan a design for the church, Narthex and surroundings, and are able to put these changes in place through teamwork and the help of volunteers who hang and help carry and move items. Karla and Karen work with a tight budget, which is supplemented by fundraisers such as the Easter Flower Memorial. This Memorial brought in \$3,400 this year,

which was used for flowers, fabric and more.

"Parishioners were very generous this year and we were able to do a lot with the money raised and decorate the church beautifully," Karen said.

One of the more stunning features this Lent was the cross display in the Narthex. A plain wooden cross was

surrounded by stones and draped in a purple cloth during Advent. The display was transformed for Easter – complete with a white draped cloth and an abundance of flowers and live plants.

In addition to purchasing some new items (many of which we can re-use), Karla and Karen familiarized themselves with every nook and cranny in the various closets and storage rooms throughout our facility. Many of these items, purchased years ago, are in great condition and can be used at some point during the year. For the Feast of the Divine Mercy, the two located a Divine Mercy picture in storage and made it part of the Narthex display. They also have plans in place for "Ordinary Time," which they promise will not be ordinary.

DELVING DEEPER AND NURTURING SEEDS TO MEET ACADEMIC NEEDS

St. John the Baptist School has been blessed with a phenomenal opportunity that is profoundly changing the way its students' individual academic needs are successfully fulfilled. In 2013, an anonymous funding source made a generous contribution enabling SJB to enhance and greatly expand its

resource programs tailored to meet the needs of high ability students and students benefitting from special education. Made possible wholly by this charitable donation are two programs that are transforming academics at SJB for current students and future generations alike—the DEEP (Diocese of Evansville Enrichment Program) and SEEDS (Special Education for Evansville Diocesan Students) programs.

The overwhelming success of these programs lies in the concept of "differentiated education," or identifying each student's unique learning style and placing them into an academic environment where they'll develop and thrive. All students, even those not directly served, benefit from the SEEDS and DEEP programs. The outside support from the specialized teachers allows more time for the classroom teacher to focus on the other learners. Anytime a school is better equipped to meet the students' individual learning necessities, it is a huge blessing to our families, school and parish. The DEEP program serves high ability (gifted and talented) learners who show cognitive characteristics such as less need for repetition, heightened ability to problem solve, in-depth interests, curiosity, and high capacity memory. SJB students are periodically and systematically evaluated to determine if they need high ability services in language arts or math. Classroom curriculum and instruction is then adjusted to include two main components of high ability education—enrichment (delving deeper into content) and acceleration (moving at a quicker, yet fitting, pace).

"Although the DEEP program began at SJB without any prior knowledge of the needs of the school, this could not be a better environment to build a high ability program," says Mrs. Maria Janney, SJB's DEEP teacher licensed in preschool through twelfth grade high ability education. "First, we have a tremendous number of students who qualify for these

services even with the uppermost standard of identification measures. Secondly, we have a forward-thinking principal who is enthusiastic about building this program and really meeting the student needs that we have uncovered. Finally, this is an open-minded and energetic staff of teachers who have embraced the idea of high ability education and continue to enhance their methods. "High ability education is not elitism or favoritism," explains Mrs. Janney. "In reality, it is a necessary form of special education. It is about taking those students who do not fit the typical classroom profile and providing them with fitting instruction and curriculum. By doing so, we maximize their chances to reach their full academic potential which is our goal for every child at our school." Studies have shown that high ability students, if not challenged and academically stimulated, are at risk of disengagement, under-achievement, identity issues, loneliness, poor study skills, and poor work ethic. This is a risk that SJB is simply not willing to take.

The number of students benefitting from DEEP has grown steadily since its inception in 2013. SJB is proud and pleased to add another high ability math teacher to its faculty beginning with the 2015-2016 school year. This will help meet the needs of DEEP math students, some of whom are currently taking math a year above grade level. It opens up new possibilities for collaboration and advanced courses. "I'm passionate about high ability education because I believe that every child has the right to be appropriately challenged and fully engaged in his or her learning," Mrs. Janney concludes.

The goal of the SEEDS program is to assist students in finding as much success as possible in the general classroom with the support of the special education team. Classroom teachers have welcomed the added resource of SEEDS, which provides extra support to students identified with a disability as well as others experiencing difficulty academically or socially. As students struggle with various concepts in the classroom, teachers have the ability to collaborate with the SEEDS teachers to find an appropriate plan to meet their needs. The SEEDS team is able to form and meet with small groups of students who are similarly challenged or, when necessary, provide more individualized services.

"Our special education program now has two full-time certified teachers as well as a full-time teaching assistant in the resource room. This has allowed the SEEDS staff the opportunity to research and implement multi-sensory strategies in the resource room as well as incorporate these strategies in the general grade level classrooms," says Mrs. Christan Shockley, licensed special education teacher. "More specifically, we have begun using the Wilson Reading System, which is a multi-

sensory reading approach reaching students reading at two grade levels below their peers."


